Inversion for Emphasis

1. **Not only is the room** spacious, (but) it is also very comfortable.

Not until they offer him a decent salary will he come back to the company.

Never have I been so insulted!

Never again will I allow myself to be tricked so easily.

No sooner had I sat down than the cat demanded his dinner.

2. **Not only did you arrive** late, (but) you didn't bring any wine.

Not until you've actually been there do you understand the true beauty of the place.

3. She didn't answer his call. **Only then did he** really start to worry.

Hardly had I met her when she started criticizing my clothes.

Rarely have I been so embarrassed.

- In formal English, or to be more expressive, we sometimes change the word order.
 - 1. This structure is used with negative expressions such as: Not only..., Never again..., No sooner...
- When we use inversion for the above expressions, we change the order of the subject and the auxiliary verb/verb in the same way as we structure a question.

e.g. Not only the house room is spacious O Not only is the house spacious V

Compare: I have never been in such an embarrassing situation.

Never have I been in such an embarrassing situation.

- 2. In the present simple and past simple tense, rather than simply changing the position of the verb and the subject, we use the auxiliary verb "do" just as we would when forming a question.
- 3. Inversion is also used after the expressions: Only then..., Only when, Hardly/scarcely..., Rarely...
