

## be used to/would + INF

- I used to walk to work every morning, but these days I take the bus. He didn't use to. They didn't use to travel much, but now they explore a new country every year.
- 2. When I was young, I used to play football with my friends. We would go to the park every afternoon after school.

1. We use *used to/didn't used to* + INF to talk about states or repeated/continuous actions in the past and which are no longer true.

• Used to is not used in the present tense. For present habits we use usually or a similar adverb.

e.g. I usually have eggs for breakfast these days.

I used to have eggs for breakfast these days.

2. We also use *would* + INF to talk about repeated actions in the past but NOT states.

**e.g.** I would go to the village to spend the summer with my grandparents when I was a child. I would have long hair when I was a little girl.

## be used to/get used to + -ing

- 1. I am **not used to getting up** so early. I've always worked in the afternoons Sam is **used to working** with children. She's been a schoolteacher for years.
- A: I can't get used to speaking Spanish all day. It's really tiring me out.
  B: You'll get used to it after a few months. It's just a matter of time.
- 1. Use be used to + ing to talk about a new situation which is now familiar and is no longer strange
- 2. Use *get used to* + ing to talk about a situation which is **becoming** familiar and less strange.
